Unlike sewerage, rain and other runoff from your street and around your home is not treated.

This water is known as 'stormwater' and flows into the nearest waterway.



Stormwater becomes polluted when it picks up litter, dog droppings, leaves and oil from the streets and around your home.

This polluted water harms the wildlife that lives in the bush, Scotts Creek and Middle Harbour.





Enjoy your local bushland

Your suburb has many beautiful bushland reserves for you and your family to enjoy.

Visit the restored banks of Scotts Creek in Muston Park or explore the Middle Harbour foreshore tracks of North Arm and Harold Reid Reserves.

Council also runs free guided bushwalks and has guide maps for many walking tracks and reserves.


